Meeting opened by president David W. H. Cartmell. Colors posted by the Gov. Isaac Shelby Color Guard. Pledge of Allegiance led by Comp. Will Schrader, SAR pledge led by Comp. Tom Payne. Invocation by Comp. Forrest Chilton.

In attendance in addition to the above, historian Don Perkins, VP P. Thomas Higgins,II, Treas. Richard B. Bierman, VPG Central District and alt. National Trustee Stephen C. Emery, Registrar-Gen. J. David Sympson and compatriots Michael Colgrove, Arthur Jefferies, Clifford Jones, Jesse B. Mountjoy, John D. Mountjoy, Ed. N. Myles, Alex. T. Probus, Norbert H. Rawert, Nobel L. Roberts, Charles E. Scott, Eugene E. Siler and Phillip Yenowine, representing

the Charles Gatliff, George Mason, Isaac Shelby, Louisville Thruston, and Robert Mosely chapters, and six guests, who were introduced.

The meeting was held at the College of the Cumberlands, hosted by V. P. Michael Colgrove at the Hutton School of Business, a replica of Independence Hall. The other buildings also are of colonial style, in keeping with the college's commitment to become known as the "other Williamsburg". Dr. Colgrove then led the ladies present on a campus tour.

Approval of the Minutes, Treasurer's Report: The agenda and the meeting minutes of 29 March, 2008 were approved. Treas.

Dick Bierman reported our financial standing in detail and it was decided that only the first four summary pages need to be presented in the future for brevity's sake. Comp. Perkins asked about auditing the accounts and Pres. Cartmell responded that Comp. Floyd L. Jernigan, chair of the auditing committee conducted a thorough audit on Comp. Charles W. Grissett's tenure in March when the office changed hands and will perform an annual audit and present it at our annual meeting. Our congratulations are extended to Charles W. Grissett for his excellent stewardship.

Pres. Cartmell could not attend our National Congress in Sacremento due to a last minute court case. Cartmell noted that the Kentucky Historical Society is once again accepting requests for historical markers. Chapters are urged to make requests, take part in dedication ceremonies and to help raise funds for them.

Comp. Sympson mentioned that the historical marker provided by the Kentucky Society at the site of Fort Nelson has disappeared. Since it is close by the new NS-SAR headquarters building, this would be a good project.

Chancellor Michael A. Richardson has completed the process of reinstatement of the Kentucky Society's registration. The registration papers are in our Secretary's possession for safekeeping. Annual reports are required by the State, due each June.

Officer Reports: President-Elect, Historian and Newsletter Editor Don Perkins reported that during his recent health problems he attempted to remain in contact with various officers, although prevented from traveling.. The State Web Site was published on July 19th: kyssar.org. A color version of the latest Ky. Pioneer newsletter downloadable is included. A feedback feature provides direct member contact with the officers. A long list of Ky. Patriots is given which we hope members will add to in time. A descriptive list of Ky. Battles expands upon the SAR website link. Host will be K.S.C.A.R.

Concerns were also expressed by Don about Youth Award recipients, Christy Culbreth (Essay winner) and Austin Major(Oratory winner). Austin Major did not compete in the national contest due to a conflict schedule with his new role as a Senate Page. Comp. Schrader responded that we had no second or third place contestants to provide runners up. If other chapters had sponsored contestants, the state might have had a national caliber contestant to compete at national.

VP Higgins reported that the Gov. Isaac Shelby color guard presented a program at the second meeting of the revitalized Charles Duncan Chapter. Also, in his ca-

pacity as Director of the Eagle Scout Program, he received 12 applications for Court of Honor certificates including an Eagle Scout at the Ky. School For the Blind. Tom also is manning a KYSSAR information booth at the Kentucky Historical Society/Kentucky Genealogical Society in Frankfort Aug. 30, 31.

Secretary Schrader reported being contacted about reviving two dormant chapters since our March meeting . On April 7, Comps, Payne, Sympson and Schrader attended the reorganizational meeting of the Charles Duncan Chapter in Bowling Green with new president J.Thomas Moore and Sec. Frank Melton. Also, Comp James Strohmeyer informed Schrader of efforts to revive the Lafayette Chapter in Lexington. Gov. Isaac Shelby Ch. President Forrest Chilton volunteered his color guard to support the Lafayette chapter re-activation ceremonies.

Report of the National Trustees: Comp. Stephen C. Emery (2007-8) noted that five measures were adopted at the National Congress which affect KYSSAR members:

Engineering and Architectural Work on National Head-1. quarters building Expense (\$416,250) will be spent prior to the build out of the CAAH;

Encouragement of all state societies to participate in the 2. Wreaths-Across America program. See SAR.org link;

3 The NSSAR Constitution was amended to delete the requirement that Junior members also be members of C.A.R.;

4. That memorial memberships be permitted for deceased males of the same family as a current member;

That supplemental applications of the same family receive 5. reduced fees similar to initial applications.

Comp. Emery also noted that, as of 30 June 2008, \$2,057,371 was donated to CAAH, including \$40,110 by 96 members of the Kentucky Society. Also, Comp. Emery discussed arrangements for the Central District meeting in Covington on Oct. 24-25 and urged all KYSSAR members to participate.

Comp. Thomas L. Payne was installed as the KYSSAR's National Trustee for 2008-9 at the National Congress. Tom noted that home schooled youth are a good source for contestants, which chapters might do well to tap. Comp. Payne then presented awards won by the Ky. Society and its chapters (See other articles this issue).

Comp. Sympson also presented the Ky. Society two activity streamers he obtained representing the Society at historic commemorations, viz. the Last Naval Battle (FI. Society) and the Battle of Kettle Creek (Ga. Society sponsor).

Chapter Reports: Charles Gatliff: Pres. J. B. Mountjoy reported that the chapter met 10 times during the year, including twice with the local DAR chapter. His chapter presented 10 JROTC medals

and 1 ROTC medal. They also sponsored a candidate in the State Eagle Scout competition. Members meet with veterans on Veterans day and cleaned the grave marker for Julia Markham, a lady who won commendation from the Federal Gov't during the Civil War.

George Mason Chapter: Pres. David Cartmell reported that the chapter met jointly with the local DAR chapter on Flag day and Independence day, and jointly sponsored a float in the Maysville Independence Day parade with the DAR. They also help the VFW.

Louisville Thruston Chapter: Meets five times a year, most recently Flag day. The Constitution Day meeting this Sept. is jointly sponsored with DAR. The chapter regularly sponsors candidates for the Youth Program Contests and presented 10 JROTC and 2 ROTC medals. It has an active color guard (40 to 50 events/yr.) including naturalization ceremonies each month, participates in grave markings and national events such as the memorial ceremony at Zachary Taylor Cemetery (Pres. W. C. Schrader, III).

Robert Moseley Chapter: Pres. Tom Payne reported that the chapter is still in reorganization. Members presented 5 JROTC medals this spring.

Gov. Isaac Shelby Chapter: Pres. Forrest Chilton noted that this chapter has an active color guard, which participated in commemorations at Cowpens, Guilford Court House, Arkansas Post, and Martin's Station as well as 4 grave markings, a Memorial Day ceremony in Jeffersontown, the flag retirement ceremony at National Headquarters and the revival of the Charles Duncan chapter. GISC presented 8 JROTC medals, patriotic programs at 4 schools, and a summer camp for 70 youngsters.

Committee Reports: Web Site Development: Published July 19th. This will be turned over to K.S.C.A.R as host.

Veterans Affairs and Patriotic Grave Marking. Comp. Chilton has scheduled 10 additional grave markings, including 4 in Western Cemetery in Louisville. One is for Capt. James Patton, who accompanied George Rogers Clark and established the first fort on the shore, the core for the development of Louisville. GISC also participated in the massing of the colors on Memorial Day (MOCC sponsored). The 226th anniversary of the Battle of Blue Licks will be commemorated on Aug. 16th (Anniversary is Aug. 18.)

A Daniel Boone impersonator, Stephen Caudell, will speak at the luncheon.

To qualify for various awards and recognitions associated with veterans activities, Comp. Chilton needs chapter reports by the end of the Year.

Old Business: Senate Joint Resolution 182, concerning collection of flags and their preservation was passed and a copy is entrusted to Sec. Schrader for safekeeping.

Increase in State dues with respect to competition for contestants: Dues are increased to \$13.00.

New Business: National Congress Planning Chair Larry Guzy approached Sec. Schrader suggesting that the Kentucky Society host the 125th meeting in 2014 in Louisville. NS-

SAR will fund the host reception. Comp. Sympson reported a naturalized citizen in Lexington who flies 8000 American flags, and it was decided to award a Certificate of Appreciation. Also, KYSSAR purchased a wreath for ceremonies last year.

Concluding events: Members are reminded of the upcoming meetings - The fall Trustee/ Leadership Meeting on Sept. 25-27 in Louisville, the KYSSAR Meeting on Oct. 4th in Bowling Green, the Central District Meeting in Covington on Oct. 24-25, the Spring Trustee/Leadership Meeting on Mar. 5-7 in Louisville, the KYSSAR Annual Meeting sometime in March, and the 119th annual National Congress on July 4-8, in Atlanta.



The Ferguson Rifle-John Frazee of Louisville Thruston Chapter provided his photo from his rifle collection of this rare weapon. Major Patrick Furguson was the officer who commanded Tories at Kings Mountain in South Carolina. On Oct. 7, 1780, he was killed and his troops captured by backwoods and the overmountain men commanded by six colonels, including Col. Isaac Shelby, the first and the fifth Kentucky governor.

Some contend that if Furguson's selfdesigned rifle had been available at Kings Mountain that the War's outcome may have been different. His version was breech loaded and fast, expecially for a rifle which would otherwise take a full minute to load (Muzzleloaders were standard).

Early in the war, Ferguson devised a rifle with spiral grooves in the barrel (called rifling). At the base of the barrel was an iron plug that could be screwed up and down, allowing a charge to be loaded. This was done by rotating the guard one time. Another difference: the lock mechanism was smaller than the one on the brown bess. The stock looked much the same, only smaller.

This rifle was used in the Battle of Brandywine in 1777. After the Battle, it was decided to recall them and they were never used again. It was thought that the cost of making them and the large inventory on hand of the Brown Bess had much to do with the recall.

The main reason for inventing this rifle was to prevent the soldier from being forced to stand up (and expose himself to enemy fire) when he reloaded. The ramrod was still standard equipment but used only for cleaning.

The shorter Ferguson rifle's length is compensated by the bayonet's length, making it only a few inches shorter than the Brown Bess musket with bayonet attached. You will, however, note the resemblance to the Brown Bess. - by Dan Klinck.




