The truckload of items, displayed above, picked up 10,136m Service to Veterans points for the Simon Kenton Chapter. Our secret is finding a large middle school with about a 1000 students and have a contest offering the homeroom bringing in the most personal care, personal comfort, books, recent magazines, coats, sweaters...gloves..hats..socks...etc a pizza party, which costs about \$60. We usually have donations to offset the cost, but I'm sure if we passed the hat around at a meeting we could cover the cost. In November we had a Veterans Day contest. The December contest was a Christmas collection for needy & homeless Vets. The contest was so successful we awarded the school four homeroom pizza parties. The school principal picked up half of the cost from his account. In March we will use another school or two. Also, Jackie Miller was a huge contributor who worked on all the vendors at the Flea Market where he has several booths. We collected books....mostly hardback & also paperback, magazines, personal hygiene & comfort items, movie DVDs, VHS tapes, music CDs, a variety of clothing (coats, hats, socks, gloves, sweaters,, pants), large screen, but older style TV sets .. 

Progress report—Construction of SAR Genealogical Library











The library building was gutted. The wooden floor on the first floor was removed. The back wall was torn down and rebuilt at a height to match the false façade on the front of the building. A concrete floor has been poured in the basement and metal studs were placed around the perimeter. These studs now support metal beams that holds the new concrete floor recently poured for the first floor of the library.

The first floor of the library has just been framed. The mezzanine is now being built and the roof will be removed before building the second floor of the library building. Rooms in the basement have also been framed. The projected completion date for the library is mid 2010.

After the library is finished, construction for headquarters, the museum and the Center for Advancing America's Heritage will begin.

True Story

When I joined the SAR, I noticed that Forrest Chilton was a member. I was in the library and told Michael Christian that I used to work with Forrest and we both played outfield on our company's championship softball team. Michael said that he knew the "Rev" and would mention to him that I was a new member. I was on my way to the 225th anniversary of the Battle of Kings Mountain when my cell phone rang—it was Forrest. I had not heard from him for over 45 years. Forrest invited me to attend an organization meeting of a new chapter being formed and also asked me to join him at a grave marking in Anderson County.

I did not have an uniform so I put together what I thought might substitute for one—an old fishing shirt, a pair on black levi's with the legs tucked down in some long socks and my Dad's hunting knife. After the ceremony, Forrest mentioned that we needed live music and flowers for future grave marking services. Right there, I decided that I would try to learn to play the fife. I took some lessons and practiced every day until I could play a few songs. I am not very good, but I try to add something by playing the fife at all of our grave marking services. We also purchased a chapter wreath that we present in honor of the Patriot.

Then I purchased a hunting shirt (\$50) and a tricorn hat (\$40) and a pair of blue knee breeches (\$60).

I could have worn just the shirt and hat and an old pair of wash pants and got by for about \$90.

Actually, I got some of these items for Christmas. So I got by cheap.

I had purchased the hunting shirt because my Patriot ancestor was in the militia.

Then, because I play the fife I purchased a red 1770's waistcoat. (\$100)

I bought red because fifers reversed the colors that the soldiers wore.

These expenditures were spread over a couple of years.

My purpose for writing the above is to encourage others to get some type of uniform and start taking part in SAR activities. In the last five years I have been involved in 140 SAR activities. When I first mentioned buying an uniform, my wife asked me: "How many times do you expect to wear a uniform???" By the way, I have loaned my hunting shirt to three members of our chapter. When they decide to get their own outfit, I pass it on to another new member—that \$50 has paid dividends! Charlie Scott
