Prostate Cancer: Prostate cancer is one of the most common cancers in men, mostly in men who are 65 or older; it is rare in men under 40 unless there is a genetic or family history. Although you may not have any symptoms, you may experience difficult or frequent urination especially at night, blood in the urine or semen, burning or pain during urination, or erectile dysfunction. To screen for or detect prostate cancer, doctors use the prostate-specific antigen (PSA) blood test and a rectal examination to feel for the prostate size and any lumps or nodules, followed by a biopsy if there are any irregularities. Ultrasound, MRI, or CT scans can also be used. Neither the PSA or digital examination is 100% accurate in detecting the disease because there can be false negative (normal tests with cancer) or false positive (abnormal tests but no cancer) results.

Treatment for prostate cancer is based on the risk of the cancer. Lower risk cancers can potentially be actively managed with surveillance. Intermediate and higher risk cancers usually require consideration of treatment and may involve surgical removal of the prostate, radiation in the form of therapy using an X-ray machine or by implanting radioactive seeds in the tumor or nearby, or hormonal therapy to block testosterone production/chemotherapy if the cancer is advanced. If the cancer is found early, the 5-year survival rate is nearly 100%. Most prostate cancers are slow-growing and older men usually die of other major health problems before they die of their prostate cancer. While nearly 1 in 9 men may develop prostate cancer, approximately 1 in 40 men actually die of prostate cancer. You and your doctor should discuss whether and when you should be screened for prostate cancer. If you are diagnosed with prostate cancer, you and your cancer team can discuss the risk group of your cancer and which management option may be best for you.

250 Years of Liberty



The jury declared, October 30, 1770, a verdict of not-guilty in Captain Thomas Preston's role in the Boston Massacre, the horrid incident on King Street, March 5th, 1770. He was tried separately from his men. John Adams led the defense, getting a not guilty verdict on his 35th birthday after a week long trial. Three years later, John Adams would write in his diary:

1773. March 5th. Fryday.

Heard an Oration, at Mr. Hunts Meeting House, by Dr. Benja. Church, in Commemoration of the Massacre in Kings Street, 3 Years ago. That large Church was filled and crouded in every Pew, Seat, Alley, and Gallery, by an Audience of several Thousands of People of all Ages and Characters and of both Sexes.

I have Reason to remember that fatal Night. The Part I took in Defence of Captn. Preston and the Soldiers, ocured me Anxie-

procured me Anxiety, and Obloquy enough. It was, however, one of the most gallant, generous, manly and disinterested Actions of my whole Life, and one of the best Pieces of Service I ever rendered my Country. Judgment of Death against those Soldiers would have been as foul a Stain upon this Country as the Executions of the Quakers or Witches, anciently. As the Evidence was, the Verdict of the Jury was exactly right.

This however is no Reason why the Town should not call the Action of that Night a Massacre, nor is it any Argument in favour of the Governor or Minister, who caused them to be sent here. But it is the strongest of Proofs of the Danger of standing Armies.

The unhappy Sufferers were Mess.s SAM.L GRAY, SAM.L MAVERICK, JAM.S CALD-WELL, CRISPUS ATTUCKS & PAT.K CARR Killed. Six wounded; two of them (CHRIST.R MONK & JOHN CLARK) Mortally.

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
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My Blessed, Wretched Life: Rebecca Boone's Story by Sue Kelly Ballard

Rebecca's own story, as imagined creatively by Sue Kelly Ballard, is so captivating, so gut-wrenchingly realistic, so obviously genuine, we begin to acknowledge who really moved America westward: our pioneer mother ancestors. Ballard's descriptions of the sights and sounds of the sylvan wilderness, of life's daily routine around a cabin set in a clearing made in the woods, and of the people and animals, both welcomed and unwelcomed, who come there are not segregated into long passages, but are tossed in generously as short snippets on top of the action, keeping the reader easily imagining the setting and circumstances as the story roars ahead. When a dozen things are happening at once, it takes a skilled frontier woman and a talented writer to keep everyone and everything moving along together.



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
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
